

GOOD OLD DAYS

You have heard that saying haven't you? A lot of people say I wish I could go back to the good old days. Well those days have come and gone.

I remember growing up on a small farm. We moved there in 1946 and had no running water, or bathrooms in the house. We had a fire place in one room and stove in the living room and mama cooked on a wood stove for several years because, we had no electricity until around 1955.

We used oil lamps to see at night. The telephone was a wall phone that you had to ring short rings and long rings depending on who you were calling

I remember getting up at about 4:30 in the morning, when dad and I would milk 18 cows by hand.

Then come to the house and eat breakfast before catching the school bus sometime after 6:00 in the morning. Did not have breakfast at school like they do now.

We cut wood with ax and two man cross cut saw. Had to haul long poles on a wagon to the house and then cut it up and some had to be cut for mama's cook stove; which means it had to be smaller pieces.

Our bathroom was outside, it was called an outhouse. Getting up in the middle of the night when it was cold was not a pleasant thing. In the summer time

had to watch out for a snake and wasps.

The church building where we attended had a two big stoves to heat the building and no padded seats. You know everybody came, when they were not sick. That is what was called the good old days!

Would you have like to have lived then? Well I would take nothing for the experience and the education of living on a farm.

But think about this. Today we have all the conveniences, and still people grip about what they don't have.

We should be thankful for the improvements we now experience in our homes and in the church buildings?

Here we have nice warm or cool buildings that have a timer to start the heat or cool air, padded pews and indoor bathrooms, drinking fountain, heated baptistery. And yet, people don't come!

Back then, we had to go to the creek to baptize and it didn't matter the time of year.

You really want to know something; we are living in good days now, but most just don't realize how blessed they really are.

Would you like to go back?
